## Dual Enrollment Student/Parent Information and Agreement for Courses Taken at Florida Southwestern State College

This agreement outlines the policies and procedures that dual enrollment students are expected to follow. Students and parent/guardian are required to agree to the items listed below. Please read each item and initial next to each. Please sign the bottom, stating you have read, understand and agree to the following:

Student Initial	Parent Initial	
		1. Courses taken at FSW are a part of both the high school transcript and college transcript and should be taken very seriously as they will remain a part of the permanent academic record.
		2. The high school bell schedule, block schedule, and calendar do not coincide with those of FSW. Careful consideration of these factors is necessary when selecting the appropriate college courses. The high school schedule takes precedence. Students taking an online course must have reliable on-line access.
		3. Upon registering for courses via the Dual Enrollment form signed by the high school counselor, the student will provide a copy of the college schedule to the school counselor. The student shall provide a copy of the college schedule to the school counselor within two school days of receiving the signed Dual Enrollment form.
		4. Dual enrollment is recommended only for independent, self-motivated students. Students are responsible for all aspects of their coursework. Parents and high school staff do not have access to grades until the end of each semester when the college reports the final course grade(s) to the high school. There is no communication between the college professor and the high school or parent.
		5. It is the dual enrollment student's responsibility to know when college course(s) start and to begin the coursework on time. Students shall log onto the college website to find the college calendar and view when classes start and end.
		6. Textbooks shall be issued according to the following process: Upon counselor's receipt of the Student Detail Schedule from the student, textbooks shall be requested from the District book repository by the high school textbook designee. <b>Classes added after the dual enrollment deadline may not have textbooks available for the first day of class.</b> All Dual Enrollment instructional materials must be ordered through this process.
		7. <b>The School District is unable to refund instructional material purchases made by students or parents.</b>
		8. All textbooks and materials are the property of the Lee County School District and must be returned to the high school within five days of the course end date. <b>Failure to return issued textbooks/materials will result in charges to the student's account requiring repayment in full.</b>
		9. The FSW drop/add period is offered only during the first week of the college semester. This semester's drop/add deadline is: <u>January 16, 2018</u> . <b>Students may not drop a dual enrollment course after the drop/add period ends.</b> Dropping a course requires a Drop Request form to be completed and signed by the school counselor. It is the student's responsibility to take the signed Drop Request form to the FSW Registrar by the drop/add deadline to drop the course. Students are required to return proof of dropping the course to the high school counselor within two school days of receiving the signed permission to drop form. Dropping a dual enrollment course may result in the high school schedule being changed to schedule a high school course in place of the dropped college course.
		10. After the drop/add period deadline, students are unable to withdraw from a dual enrollment course.

		If extenuating circumstances arise, see your high school counselor and Assistant Principal for Curriculum as soon as possible. Withdrawal requests are very rare and are not guaranteed to be approved. Remember, there are college consequences to withdrawal and this is an option of last resort.
		11. Full-time students are required to provide a current phone number and email address to their school counselor. Students are further required to check in with their high school counselor on a monthly basis to ensure progress may be monitored and that the student is kept aware of all high school activities and deadlines. It is the student's responsibility to check the FMHS website and other resources for important dates and reminders.
		12. Dual enrollment students must maintain the required unweighted high school GPA. (Freshmen/sophomores: minimum unweighted 3.5 GPA. Juniors/seniors minimum unweighted 3.0 GPA.) If a student's GPA falls below the requirement, the student will be exited from the dual enrollment program. Students are also required to maintain a minimum college 2.0 GPA. <b>A grade of "F" earned in a dual enrollment course may not be repeated prior to graduation.</b>
		13. It is the student's responsibility to request and pay for transcripts of FSW coursework to be sent to future institutions of acceptance.

- Personal items such as sunglasses, watches, hats, handbags, backpacks, and/or umbrellas.
